# Students Grow Cabbages

Growing With Farmers Cooperative is the theme used for this year's Cabbage Plant Growing Contest. When you see a third grader wearing one of our Cooperative T Shirts with the logo, "Growing With Farmers Cooperative" you'll know they spent a lot of time caring for their cabbage for the weigh in on Saturday, May 15 in Live Oak, and on May 22 at our Madison Co-op store.

Farmers Cooperative and Bonnie Plant teamed up again for their second annual Cabbage Plant Growing Contest. This year the Cooperative expanded the program to include all third grade classes at Westwood Christian School, Branford Elementary School, Madison County Central School, Greenville Elementary School, Lee Elementary School and Pinetta Elementary School.

**GENERAL MANAGER** Todd Lawrence, Agronomy Division Manager, Barry Long, and Madison Manager Eddie Curl, delivered 800 plants to the various elementary schools in their area. Financial Secretary, Heather Kelley and all the managers provided pizza parties for the winners.

In order for third graders to be eligible for the Bonnie Plant Farms Cabbage Contest, they simply had to plant the cabbage plant, provide the nutrients and attention

the cabbage needed, and just watch it grow. Farmers Cooperative provided a small bag of fertilizer and a garden trowel free. Farmers Cooperative's website provided complete instructions on how to grow their Bonnie Plant cabbage.

We had a total of 24 class winners in the Cabbage Plant Growing Contest this year. Additionally, class winners will be entered into the State Bonnie Plant Farms drawing for a chance to win a \$1,000 scholarship from Bonnie Plant Farms.

Our third grade gardeners learned responsibility along with a real sense of accomplishment to see how they can grow their own food. Children were encouraged to bring their cabbage to the weigh in regardless of the size or weight. In fact, they ranged from 20.19 pounds on down.

# Control Winter Heating Bills

**WHAT IS A Level Pay Plan** you might ask? Well a Level Pay Plan is where Farmers Cooperative estimates your annual cost of your propane-heating bill and then equally divides it up so that you make the same payment each month. Since this amount is only an estimate, the month of May is a month that the program ends and the balance is to be settled. If your account has a credit balance, Farmers Cooperative will owe you money, which can either be

applied to next year's Level Pay Plan or Farmers Cooperative will issue you a check for the credit balance. If you owe Farmers Cooperative then the balance is to be paid in full before the end of May.

**THE BENEFITS OF** choosing the Level Pay Plan is that you avoid receiving and paying for a large heating bill in the middle of winter, usually near holidays, allowing you to better manage your household budget.

# Smell Gas? Be Propane Smart!

The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services has determined that over 1/3 of all propane-related accidents in Florida occur when appliances are worked on by unlicensed and untrained technicians. When gas appliances are removed from the premises and gas lines previously connected to these appliances are left open, fires and explosions may result when the gas is turned on. Florida law requires consumers and property owners to notify the gas dealer who next fills or services their propane equipment of any changes made to the propane system, especially when an appliance is removed. Safety is your responsibility.

If you smell gas you should follow these steps:

**NO FLAMES OR SPARKS!** Do not operate lights, appliances, telephones, or cell phones.

**LEAVE THE AREA IMMEDIATELY!** Get out of the building or area where you suspect gas is leaking.

**SHUT OFF THE GAS.** Turn off the main gas supply on your propane tank if it is safe to do so.

**REPORT THE LEAK.** From an area away from the leak, contact Farmers Cooperative by calling the local store number. Be sure that you leave a number where you can be reached at other than where the leak is suspected.

**DO NOT RETURN TO THE AREA.** Make sure that Farmers Cooperative or your local fire department has determined that it is safe to re-enter the area.

**GET YOUR SYSTEM CHECKED.** Do not use any propane appliances until Farmers Cooperative has done an entire system check to ensure that it is leak-free.

Since there is a possibility of odor fade or problems with your sense of smell, you should respond immediately to even a faint odor of gas. If you have any further questions about the safety of propane, Farmers Cooperative will be glad to answer them and provide safety brochures that you and your family can review.
